

The club was formed in the 1990s and for the coming 2023/24 season, it will be fielding 39 squads, more than it has ever done. It reflects the growing size of the town, the increasing demand for junior football and of course, the big uptake in female participation throughout the age groups.

The big news for this coming season is the club's launch of the town's first women's team which is important on two fronts. Firstly, it was long overdue and secondly, it provides a pathway into adult football for our girls with some teams nearing that step into senior football.


It is something that the club has been planning for some time and it formed part of our 5-year development plan that was finalised at the start of 2023 and is being circulated with this handbook. The plan is aspirational and wide-ranging and includes our hope to cement and build on relationships with Morpeth Town FC, the redevelopment of Morpeth Common to allow a better concentration of teams in and around Craik Park whilst clearly defining our vision and ethos of the club.

OUR IDENTITY / OUR ETHOS


The club's identity is everything the club stands for. As well as physical and tangible things such as club colours, it includes:

- Its vision and values.
- The club ethos as represented by players, coaches, volunteers and spectators in terms of creating the right standards and culture on and off the pitch.
- The way we coach and play.

This is taken from the club's development plan and we define our visions, missions, ethos and how we seek to coach and play in that accompanying document, but our overall objective is as follows:

"Morpeth Town Juniors to be a distinct, respected and community focussed club run for the benefit of its members."

This underpins the way we operate and the decisions we make, at the same time seeking to set standards in grassroots football. Players, Coaches, Volunteers, Parents and Spectators all play a part in defining the club's identity and maintaining those very standards.



"Governance is all the systems, policies and procedures the club employs to frame the way the club is run all the time."

This is an all-encompassing phrase, but our governance dictates everything from how we manage our financial decisions to broad guidance into the practicalities of running a squad.

However, there are certain areas which are of greater importance in terms of meeting our expectations and our stated goal of being a 'standard bearer for grass roots youth football'.

These are our:

- Codes of Conduct and Policies
- Safeguarding & Welfare
- Parental and Spectator Values

Codes of Conduct and Policies

We adhere to and endorse the various FA Codes of Conduct and Policies that are listed on our website

www.morpethtownjuniors.co.uk/documents.

There are codes that cover players, coaches and spectators, but we need to be mindful of the content of these codes so that we're not blindly highlighting them without understanding and more important acknowledging and following them.

They have to be our guiding principles when it comes to how we operate.

Safeguarding

It is our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of every child or young

person at the club and it is inherent upon us to provide a safe environment for all members. Our safeguarding policy is on our website and EVERY coach involved at the club MUST have a current 'FA Safeguarding Children qualification'. There will be occasions when the welfare of a child is raised — be it from the club's perspective or via the actions of persons not connected with the club - and we are obliged to look into these matters. Our welfare team led by Sean Douglas actions this and if anyone has any queries regarding welfare or safeguarding issues, Sean and the team can be contacted via email at welfare@morpethtownjuniors.co.uk.

Parental and Spectator Values

Sadly, the number of reported incidents involving parents and spectators at grassroots youth football nationally, is rising significantly. Our local junior league is no exception and as a club, we need to remind parents and spectators of their obligations.

Football at all age levels can prompt emotions and it is important that we all remain POSITIVE in our approach to our children and coaches and to the opposition's players and coaches. Likewise to referees and other officials.

Such has been the incidence of disciplinary issues in the Northumberland Football League (and Morpeth Town Juniors hasn't been free of them), the club will be hosting a club-wide meeting early in the season with the mandatory attendance by a coach AND a parent from every squad to reaffirm our expectations and requirements for this coming season.

Win or lose, the most important thing is that your child enjoys their footballing experience and is playing in a supportive environment, rather than a hostile, aggressive and pressuring matchday environment.

Morpeth Town Juniors FC is an unincorporated association which means it is run by a group of individuals that is bound by the club's constitution.

CLUB COMMITTEE

The club is run by a committee of volunteers as detailed opposite. We were delighted with the response to our appeal for help at the end of last season meaning that we have filled nearly all the roles required – the coach communication and football and coach development roles are ones we need to clearly define and implement over the course of this coming season.



OUR PLAYING & TRAINING VENUES



CRAIK PARK – Our older teams that play 11v11 on a full-size pitch play their home games at Morpeth Town's ground at Craik Park. A state of the art, 3G surface installed in 2021, it represents one of the best junior home pitches in the area.

CHANTRY & NEWMINSTER MIDDLE SCHOOLS – Here we have 2 youth sized 11v11 pitches for U13s and U14s and a 9v9 pitch.

PEGSWOOD WELFARE – Behind the back of the Fire Station, here we have 2 9v9 pitches for U11s and U12s and have set up a back-up full size pitch for older teams.

ABBEYFIELDS FIRST SCHOOL – A single 7v7 pitch is used by the club's U10 boys' teams.

Our younger boys and girls' teams play at various **CENTRAL VENUES.**

CRAIK PARK – Many of the club's teams use Craik Park's floodlights for winter training on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings.

CHANTRY MUGA – Another recently opened, floodlit facility that the club has access to. The venue provides a 45 x 30 sq metre 3G surface and can be hired as a single full pitch or split into two smaller areas.

CHANTRY TRAINING SHED – An indoor training venue that the club has used for a number of years.

MORPETH COMMON – The open common space is used on Sunday mornings for the pre-team Morpeth Minis and Morpeth Wildcats training sessions.

LONGHIRST – Floodlit surface owned by Morpeth Cricket, Hockey & Tennis club





OUR PLAYING & TRAINING VENUES – MORPETH COMMON



Morpeth Common is going to be central to the club's future. For many years, the club has led a nomadic existence playing at various pitches in and around Morpeth. This has been functional, but has led to a very fragmented club with the annual fun day being the only opportunity to bring it together as a whole. With the opening of the 3G pitch at Craik Park, the club has sought to restore Morpeth Common back to what it was around 30 years ago, when there were numerous full-sized pitches there.

Via extended communications involving the club, Northumberland County Council, Northumberland FA and the Football Foundation, we are on the verge of agreeing a long-term licence for use at the site. This will see works start to improve the playing surfaces over the next 9 months with the aim of having a number of new pitches ready for the beginning of the 2024/25 season.

Given its location next to Craik Park, it gives the club a real opportunity to create a 'home', where most of our teams can play and train, where we can utilise better the facilities of Morpeth Town AFC and Craik Park whilst creating a better club environment. In addition to better quality pitches which the club can manage, the senior club can benefit with increased footfall in and around their facilities thereby cementing the relationship between the Juniors and Morpeth Town AFC. A very important development for the club.



OUR CLUB COACHING

With 39 squads for the upcoming 2023/24 season, it can be difficult to present a consistent coaching style or philosophy, but in line with our club development plan we are aiming to do this. Our coaching needs to ensure the children are having FUN and get enjoyment from playing the game. It needs to be player-focused with the aim of developing a child's footballing skills in an environment where they can learn football without the pressure to win.

We align our coaching with the FA's England DNA, its four-cornered model and apply it in line with the relevant age phases of development. The FA four-cornered model encompasses four key attributes that are vital for any developing young footballer: **Physical, Technical, Psychological** and **Social** elements, helping children to develop more than just their football skills – **Helping them to gain confidence, build self-esteem, learn to work as a team and improve their decision making.**

Each team at the club aims to have a minimum of one hour's coaching per week (weather and coach availability permitting) and in addition to all coaches being DBS approved, every team must have at least one coach holding the FA's Introduction to Coaching Football qualification. That qualification can be supplemented by locally delivered coach the coach sessions run by Northumberland FA and the club is establishing a coaches' forum where best practices can be shared. Underpinning all this is the club's guide detailing 'our coaching ethos – the way we coach'. This document provides guidance and information for parents and coaches with the aim of promoting a consistent approach to coaching club-wide – what we seek to achieve and ultimately, the club will seek to appoint a football development officer whose remit will be to drive the commitment to this coaching philosophy.





A key resource available to all our coaches is the club's subscription to 'The Coaching Manual'.

It is an extensive package built for coaches who want to improve their understanding of coaching and find real, practical sessions which they can use to accelerate the development of their players

It allows our coaches to view and use ageappropriate practices and sessions, many with video demonstrations by professional and experienced coaches detailing the key coaching / learning points, all underpinned by the FA's four-cornered model.



MORPETH MINIS

MORPETH MINIS is the club's ever popular sessions for boys in the pre-team age groups (mainly Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 children, although some slightly younger attend in the summer before they start school).

It is run every Sunday morning on Morpeth Common* with sessions at 9.00 - 10.00 and 10.00 - 11.00. It is available for any child to attend, whatever their ability.

The emphasis of MORPETH MINIS is for the children to have fun whilst learning the basic motor and football skills. For those that want to, there are opportunities to join the club's U7 teams which is the youngest age group where organised games are played.

MORPETH MINIS is run by club chairman Paul Barwick (a fully qualified coach) along with DBS checked volunteers and the focus is to develop the following aspects of a child's ability:

- Ball introduction
- Small-sided games more touches for everyone
- Ball manipulation / mastery
- Skill development
- Social and confidence development
- Motor skills

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MORPETH WILDCATS mirrors MORPETH MINIS by providing pre-team football opportunities for girls (mainly for girls in School Years 1 and 2, although younger and older children still attend).

In the past, some girls used to attend Morpeth Minis, but often found it a little intimidating playing with mostly boys. Wildcats provides the ideal opportunity for girls to come along and enjoy sessions whilst accommodating an increasing demand for girls' football.

It is run every Sunday morning on Morpeth Common* (11.00 - 12.00) and is available for any girl to attend, whatever their ability.

The emphasis of MORPETH WILDCATS is for the girls to have fun whilst learning the basic motor and football skills. For those that want to, there are opportunities to join the club's U8 teams which is the youngest age group where organised girls' games are played.

MORPETH WILDCATS is run by club chairman Paul Barwick (a fully qualified coach) along with DBS checked volunteers and the focus is develop the following aspects of a child's ability:

- Ball introduction
- Small-sided games more touches for everyone
- Ball manipulation / mastery
- Skill development
- Social and confidence development
- Motor skills

GIRLS' & WOMEN'S FOOTBALL

The FA Foundation Phase is covered largely by 'Mini Soccer' which is the introduction to organised football for young players.

At the three youngest age groups, (U7 to U9), matches take place at a central venue on artificial grass with referees provided by the league. Venues include Cochrane Park in Heaton (Newcastle University's Sports Ground) or 'Goals' at Gosforth next to the racecourse. Games are played with smaller teams (5v5) with smaller pitch sizes and goals. At U9s they move to 7v7 for two years with the U10s playing home and away rather than centrally (although Saturday teams still play at Central Venues). Still using smaller balls, goals and pitch size, there remains no offsides at this stage of the game. There is also the 'retreat line' whereby opposition teams have to retreat to the half-way line when a goal kick occurs.

At U11s, they move to 9v9, bigger goals and balls and they play offside.

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PHASE

The FA Youth Development Phase covers the U12 to U16 age range. U12s operate the same format as U11s, before moving to 11-a-side at U13 & U14s (albeit with smaller sized pitch and goals). Eventually, teams start playing on a full-sized pitch and with full sized goals at U15.


OUR PATHWAY TO ADULT FOOTBALL

As an England Accredited 3-star club, we need to create a pathway into adult football for both boys and girls. It's fair to say that as a club, many of our oldest members leave to go to university, but those that do stay locally, we want to see progress into adult football.

There are options and we don't have to form our own adult teams, but for males we have a connection to Morpeth FC (see below) whose current squad includes a number of ex-juniors. On the female side, we have just launched Morpeth Town Women. This came off the back of some open sessions started back in May and has seen the launch of both the women's team and a participation squad for those that simply want to enjoy a bit of fun and exercise.

Newly launching for the 2023/24 season, a longoverdue women's team in Morpeth will be joining the Northumberland Football League Women's League.


A participation 'training-only' squad will also be running under the club's name.

OUR PATHWAY TO ADULT FOOTBALL - MORPETH WOMEN



A long overdue initiative has been the setting up of a new women's team in Morpeth.

As an England accredited club, we needed to create a pathway into adult football for our ever-increasing number of female members and this requirement, along with the fact there was no offering for adult females in the town wanting to play football, led to training sessions at Craik Park back in May.

From that, we established there was sufficient interest in setting up a team and the club has entered a squad into the Northumberland Football League's women league for the 2023/24 season with coach James Callaghan at the helm.

We have an excellent core squad in place for the start of the season, but James is looking to build the squad size over the coming weeks and months.

Keep an eye out in the local and digital media for publicity about the team and what we hope is the first step towards establishing a progressive and sustainable squad over the coming years. A squad that our older girls can move towards and join as they approach the latter years of junior membership.

ALONGSIDE the team, the club is also running a participation group for women. These will be sessions for those that don't want to be part of the playing team, but want to enjoy some coached sessions and an enjoyable kick around on a regular basis to improve fitness in a social environment.

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Our kit is bespoke to the club and not based on a manufacturer's template. Made by Errea, the home kit is the traditional amber and black stripes coupled with plain black shorts and socks, the colours worn by Morpeth Town and the Juniors for many years.

The club rarely has a colour clash when playing (aside from Berwick Rangers Juniors), so it makes no sense nor is it cost effective to buy each team a set of away shirts. However, the club has bought a stock of away shirts of varying sizes and numbers which individual squads can utilise and return as and when required. The sky-blue shirts also mirror the colours sported by the senior club in recent seasons.

The goalkeeper shirt is an Errea 'Bahia' template of lime green with black trim.

Our kit is supplied by Elite Embroidery which is based in Newburn and we have received excellent service from their representative Michael Wilson. But, given the bespoke nature of our kit (and the supply chain issues seen globally in many industries), supply and delivery of kits haven't been as quick as desired. The close season is a very tight timescale and our kit officers (latterly Nicola Dodds and now Nicky Dutta) do an excellent job of managing the many orders received from teams and, in conjunction with Michael at Elite, try to accommodate every request received within the parameters allowed by Errea.

Depending upon the age group, the kit is expected to have a minimum recyclable life of 2 or 3 years, with occasional replacement shirts between these times for new players or sudden growth spurts!

Playing kit belongs to the club, not the player. If a player leaves the club, the kit must be returned; in the case of a transfer, this will need to have taken place prior to the transfer being sanctioned in accordance with league rules.

EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES

OUR PARTNERSHIPS & COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS



Key to our development is to cement and strengthen our relationship with Morpeth Town FC. Whilst we are a totally separate entity (primarily for financial reasons as we are membership based and the senior club is run as a business), we want to be seen as part of the same so that both parties can mutually benefit from the presence of the Juniors.


